Is there any 15 public comment for the Members? 16 17 (No response.) CHAIR HOBERT: Hearing none. Welcome to the 18 regularly scheduled October 10, 2023, meeting of the 19 Illinois Finance Authority. As mentioned by Assistant 20 Secretary Brinley, we are glad that our colleague, Roger 21 Poole can fully participate in today's meeting from the 22 Authority office in Mt. Vernon, Illinois, and Brad Zeller 23 24 can fully participate in today's meeting from the ICC



1 office in Springfield, Illinois.

2	First, I want to thank Governor Pritzker's
3	office for working with us to green light the new online
4	notice policy for the Federally mandated TEFRA hearings
5	and letters. While our staff can go into greater detail,
6	the TEFRA public notice and hearing, which results in a
7	TEFRA letter where the Governor's signature, is essential
8	to close a conduit bond transaction. While still under
9	development, the new TEFRA notice approach will have
10	will save borrowers' money, conform to Federal guidelines
11	and enhance an important transparency consideration. It
12	is one of the many examples of the Governor's support to
13	the Authority and our mission.
14	Second, it is rare for an auditor to give
15	anyone a nice piece of hardware (indicating) or the
16	equivalent of a gold star, but that is what the Authority
17	has received for our internal audit program through the
18	IIA Quality Assessment Report. The full report states on
19	Page 30 starts on Page 30 of your materials. It is
20	dated May 2023 but there was a lag between the receipt of
21	the report and receipt of the hardware. Thank you to Six
22	for her ongoing work with both the external and internal
23	auditors.
24	Third, on our Climate Bank efforts, we



Page 9 have made important progress, but with each step forward, 1 there is more to be done. I appreciated our robust 2 discussion last month on the Gotion matter. I look 3 forward to similar discussions in the future. 4 5 Finally, we have good personal news from one of our valued staff Members, Brad Fletcher and his 6 7 spouse Nina who welcomed their daughter Julia Margaret into the world early on Saturday, October 7th. Everyone 8 is healthy and doing well. Congratulations to Brad and 9 his family. 10 Chris, over to you. 11 12 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MEISTER: Thank you, Will. This is Chris Meister, Executive Director. You covered the 13 high points of the written message and I'll go into 14 greater detail about the Climate Bank portion of the 15 agenda. Back to you. 16 CHAIR HOBERT: This is Will Hobert. There were no 17 committee meetings held this month. 18 Next is the presentation of New Business 19 Items. I would like to ask for the general consent of 20 the Members to consider New Business Items 1, 2, and 3 21 collectively and have the subsequent recorded vote 22 applied to each respective, individual New Business Item, 23 24 unless there are any specific New Business Items that a

CHAIR HOBERT: Hearing no need for separate 3 consideration or recusal, I would like to consider New 4 Business Items 1, 2, and 3 under the consent agenda and 5 take a roll call vote. Sara? 6 7 MS. PERUGINI: Thank you, Chair Hobert. This is Sara Perugini. At this time, I would like to note that for 8 each conduit New Business Item presented on today's 9 agenda, the Members are considering the approval only of 10 the resolution and the not-to-exceed parameters contained 11 12 therein. Item 1, Silver Hill Funding, LLC. Item 1 is a 13 PACE Bond Resolution authorizing the issuance from time 14 to time of one or more series and/or subseries of PACE 15 Bonds to be purchased by Silver Hill Funding, LLC or its 16 designated transferee in an aggregate amount not to 17 exceed \$250 million for a period of three years. This 18 PACE Bond Resolution approves the execution and delivery 19 of one or more Master Indentures whereby Silver Hill 20 Funding, LLC or its designated transferee as bond 21 purchaser may obtain any of the Authority's PACE Bonds 22 subject to the stated interest rate and maturity 23 24 limitations and further delegates to Authorized Officers



Page 11 as defined therein the capacity to execute and deliver 1 such related Issuance Certificates for qualified PACE 2 Projects hereafter. Proceeds of each Issuance 3 4 Certificate will be loaned to eligible record owners of eligible commercial properties located throughout the 5 state to fund PACE Projects. 6 Does any Member have any questions or 7 comments? 8 (No Response.) 9 MS. PERUGINI: Item 2, Southern Illinois Healthcare 10 Enterprises, Inc. Item 2 is a Resolution authorizing the 11 12 amendment of the Bond Trust Indentures relating to the \$75,580,000 Illinois Finance Authority Revenue Bonds, 13 Series 2014A Southern Illinois Healthcare Enterprises, 14 Inc. and the \$18,565,000 Illinois Finance Authority 15 Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 2021 Southern Illinois 16 17 Healthcare Enterprises, Inc., and approving related matters, relating to such Bonds issued by the Authority 18 on behalf of Southern Illinois Healthcare Enterprises 19 Inc., an Illinois not-for-profit corporation; 20 hereinafter, the Borrower. 21 Approval of the Resolution will authorize the 22 execution and delivery of Supplemental Bond Indentures 23 24 and any additional documents necessary in order to



Page 12 implement certain amendments, including changes to the 1 interest rates the Bonds will bear interest at while in 2 the current Private Placement Rate Period, as agreed to 3 4 by the Borrower and DNT Asset Trust, the purchaser and sole owner of the Bonds; hereinafter, the Purchaser. 5 The Borrower and the Purchaser will consent to the 6 7 amendments. Chapman and Cutler, LLP (hereinafter, Bond Counsel) anticipates that this transaction will be 8 considered a reissuance for tax purposes. Bond Counsel 9 is expected to provide an opinion that the amendments 10 will not adversely affect the tax-exempt status of any of 11 the Bonds. All payments relating to the Bonds were 12 current as of September 1, 2023. 13 Does any Member have any questions or comments? 14 (No response.) 15 MS. PERUGINI: Item 3, Additional Volume Cap. Item 3 16 is a Resolution of intent requesting additional 17 allocation of calendar year 2023 private activity volume 18 cap in the amount of \$611 million. Each January, IFA 19 staff submits requests for private activity volume cap to 20 the Governor's Office of Management and Budget 21 (hereinafter, GOMB) from GOMB's State Agency Pool. The 22 high interest rate environment has increased demand for 23 24 private activity volume cap. Accordingly, IFA requires



Page 13 additional private activity volume cap to fulfill its 1 commitments to its borrowers pursuant to Preliminary Bond 2 Resolutions that have been approved previously and 3 4 pursuant to Preliminary Bond Resolutions likely to be approved in calendar year 2023. IFA staff anticipates 5 that IFA has an additional need of calendar year 2023 6 private activity volume cap in the amount of \$611 7 million. State agencies including, without limitation, 8 IFA may apply to GOMB beginning on or after the first 9 State business day after June 1, 2023, for any allocation 10 retained by GOMB from its Home Rule Pool or on or after 11 July 15, 2023, for any allocation reserved by GOMB from 12 its Non-Home Rule Pool. It is unknown how much private 13 activity volume cap is available in either pool, and 14 there is no guarantee IFA will receive the amount of 15 private activity volume cap that will be requested. 16 Does any Member have any questions or comments? 17 18 (No response.) CHAIR HOBERT: This is Will Hobert. I would like to 19 request a motion to pass and adopt the following New 20 Business Items 1, 2, and 3. Page 15 ASSISTANT SECRETARY BRINLEY: And finally Chair 1 Hobert? 2 CHAIR HOBERT: Yes. 3 ASSISTANT SECRETARY BRINLEY: Again, this is Claire 4 5 Brinley. Chair Hobert, the ayes have it and the motion carries. 6 7 CHAIR HOBERT: This is Will Hobert. Six, will you please present the financial reports? 8 MS. GRANDA: This is Six Granda. Thank you Chair 9 Hobert. Good morning, everyone. Today I will be 10 presenting the financial report for the period ending 11 12 from June 30, 2023. Please note that all the information is preliminary and unaudited. The financial memo had a 13 typo on the Paragraph D. The paragraph should read, in 14 September, the Authority posted operating expenses of 15 \$296,000 which was \$81,000 lower than the monthly 16 budgeted amount of \$377,000. 17 Now, moving onto the financial information 18 beginning with operating revenue. Our year-to-date 19 operating revenue of \$466,000 are \$232,000 or 33.2 20 percent lower than budget. Our operating expenses of 21 \$919,000 are \$211,000 or 18.6 percent lower than budget. 22 This is primarily attributable to the Authority posting 23 24 and annual employee related expenses and professional



Page 16 services of \$192,000 lower than budget due to the reduced 1 staff head count and lower than expected professional 2 services. Taken together, the Authority posted an 3 operating net loss of approximately \$453,000. Our 4 non-operating activity, our year-to-date interest and 5 investment income of \$334,000 are \$166,000 or 33.3 6 percent below budget. The Authority posted a \$302,000 7 mark-to-market non-cash appreciation in its investment 8 portfolio. This non-cash appreciation coupled with an 9 approximately \$3,000 of our realized loss and the sales 10 concerning Authority investments will result in a 11 year-to-date investment income position of \$633,000, 12 which is \$133,000 higher than budget. Our year-to-date 13 operating loss of approximately \$453,000 and the 14 year-to-date investment income position of \$633,000 will 15 result in a year-to-date net income of approximately 16 \$180,000, which is \$111,000 higher than budget. 17 During our final review and adjustment for 18 Fiscal Year 2023, it was determined per the Governmental 19 Accounting Standing Board, GASB, Statement Number 33, 20 Accounting and Financial Reporting for Non-Exchange 21 Transactions, that the Authority had met the time 22 requirements per the Grant Agreement with the Department 23 24 of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, DCEO. Due to this



1 determination, the Authority had to recognize the \$3 2 million dollars from the DCEO Grant as grant income in 3 Fiscal Year 2023.

4 Additionally, the Authority had to make an adjustment under the DACA Loan Program for one student. 5 This adjustment increased our net position in the 6 reporting period. The Authority maintains a net position 7 of \$62.3 million as of September 30, 2023, an increase of 8 \$3 million due to the recognition of the DCEO Grant. 9 Total assets in the General Fund are \$64.5 million 10 consisting mostly of cash investment and receivables. 11 12 Our unrestricted cash and investments total \$48.1 million with \$4.3 million in cash. Our notes receivable from 13 former Illinois Rural Bond Bank local governments total 14 \$4.3 million. Participation Loans, Natural Gas Loans, 15 DACA loans and other receivables total \$6.8 million. In 16 September, the Authority collected \$128,000 in principal 17 from our outstanding Natural Gas Loans. Moving on to 18 other funds, in September, the Authority collected 19 \$340,000 and \$20,000 from the Fire Truck Revolving Loan 20 Fund and the Ambulance Revolving Loan Fund, respectively. 21 Now moving on to audit, the Fiscal Year 2022 22 Financial Audit Examination and the Two-Year Compliance 23 24 Examination for Fiscal Year 2022 and Fiscal Year 2023 are



Page 18 in progress and nothing to report at this time. As far 1 as Human Resources, there's nothing to report at this 2 3 time. 4 Next, we have the Report on the Climate Bank. Director Meister. 5 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MEISTER: Thank you very much, 6 7 Six, but Assistant Secretary Brinley has got an announcement. 8 ASSISTANT SECRETARY BRINLEY: This is Claire Brinley. 9 I just would like to note for the record that Member 10 Sutton joined the meeting at 9:21 a.m. Thank you. 11 12 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MEISTER: Thank you, Assistant Secretary. This is Chris Meister, Executive Director. 13 I will direct your attention to the three elements on Page 14 81 and 82 in the confidential attachments just to 15 highlight the modifications for the Climate Bank Plan 16 that we have been doing since last November, November 10, 17 2022. We have three modifications. The first one, point 18 1 is that we've signed a Memorandum of Agreement subject 19 to the completion of a state zero-dollar procurement 20 process which we expect to be completed later on today 21 and the approval of this modification today with the 22 Coalition for Green Capital a National Applicant for the 23 24 NCIF of the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund, so that is



Page 19 attached. And again, last month I had mentioned that 1 there were numerous other potential applicants. Our 2 resources are finite, but I am very comfortable with the 3 4 Coalition for Green Capital and their approach. I read a copy of their draft application circulated on Sunday 5 night. We've been gathering letters in support and we're 6 7 very comfortable. Importantly, should they be successful for their full amount of \$10 billion dollars we expect to 8 receive approximately \$200 million dollars in equity with 9 a percentage of that to be allocated towards 10 administrative and staff cost to stand that up. 11 12 Is there any questions on point one? (No response.) 13 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MEISTER: Point 2. I'll highlight 14 this and it's up on the screen. Many Players - One Team. 15 This is an approach that the Governor's office has taken 16 17 with our colleagues across State government. Point number 2 is actually an example of everybody playing 18 together on team time in a coordinated fashion. So last 19 month there was a budget line item from an 20 intergovernmental agreement that was executed-approved 21 last November and then executed later involving the 22 Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, the IFA, 23 24 the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency, and the



University of Illinois System. The University of 1 Illinois System had any number of basically the 2 equivalent to business consulting vendors available on a 3 4 roster very similar to what the Authority does with 5 investment bankers for the State Revolving Fund and for outside counsel. There was a competitive selection 6 7 process. I actually took myself out of that process due to a family relationship and McKinsey emerged and was 8 ultimately contracted. So we had some funds that were 9 available that we redirected last month in the service of 10 a Federal application to divert the McKinsey resource to 11 12 a U.S. Economic Development Administration USEDA Recompete Competitive Application. What recompete is 13 there is some details here, the State is working with 14 four communities, East St. Louis, the South Side of 15 Chicago, Springfield and Decatur to develop applications 16 to drawback and connect Members of the local workforce 17 hopefully into the climate related economy. 18 So we participated and paid for a white paper process. And 19 again, this supports ultimately the state's overall 20 objectives for Climate Bank Economic Development and 21 equity across the state. What happened late in September 22 was that there was some confusion involving the 23 24 intergovernmental agreement and we were asked to create a



small purchase agreement, again, with McKinsey to support 1 these four communities, East St. Louis, Chicago, Metro 2 East and St. Louis, to bring these four applications 3 4 across this competitive line. Those applications were 5 filed last Thursday night. Folks are pleased with that effort and ultimately the Department of Commerce and 6 7 Economic Opportunity and the IFA will execute an intergovernmental agreement and we will be repaid for the 8 second \$100,000 of the McKinsey work. 9

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10 We expect to have further discussions involving 11 the Governor's Office, DCEO, and other actors so that 12 maybe we can coordinate this so we will not have 13 confusion or misunderstanding around deadlines in the 14 future. So we're excited to be participating in this 15 Recompete effort and to contribute.

Point 3. We've been working with a local 16 applicant for the third bucket of GGRF known as the CCIA. 17 Those are going to be chunks of \$10.8 million dollars 18 that will go to community lenders, some of which are 19 created, some of which are expected to be created. And 20 the National Community Investment Fund, which 21 inconveniently shares the same acronym as the middle 22 bucket of the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund, is going to 23 24 apply involving Innovate Illinois, World Business Chicago



Page 22 and other acronyms. It's called the Rust Belts to Green 1 Belts Initiative and like many of the Greenhouse Gas 2 Reduction Fund, it focuses on the three buckets of zero 3 4 carbon transportation, zero carbon building improvements and distributed generation. 5 6 Does anyone have any questions on the 7 modifications? (No response.) 8 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MEISTER: Great. 9 So what we are attempting is a streamlined 10 presentation of the report. Everybody has seen starting 11 on Page 70, Many Players - One Team. This was something 12 that was successfully piloted by IEPA and IFA in front of 13 a Commerce Commission Policy hearing in front of the 14 Commissioners. Thanks. We're going on to the next 15 slide. This really gives in one format the high-level 16 state objectives on climate, clean energy, equity, the 17 cornerstone is the effort on zero-emission 18 transportation, hence, our involvement. 19 In Gotion last month, just to note on 20 Gotion, we have had ongoing discussion with both Gotion 21 and with the Department of Commerce and Economic 22 Opportunity, but as those crystallize, I will come back 23 24 to the Members and update all of you.



1 The next page, this is a nice little 2 snapshot prepared by IEPA of some of the resources that 3 are available under both the Bipartisan Infrastructure 4 Law and the Inflation Reduction Act. Our applications 5 and goals are included, but it gives everybody a sense of 6 the broader picture of opportunity of Federal 7 opportunities.

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Next slide, please. These are the three 8 buckets that I highlighted. Again, I've read through our 9 application for the \$7 billion dollar Solar for All, 10 Andrew Barbeau, one of our contractors who is the 11 12 architect of many of much of our strategy and execution. He is preparing that with a colleague, along with another 13 state agency, the Illinois Power Agency. The central 14 theme of our application is that between state 15 legislation on CEJA and the power agencies Solar for All 16 program, state Solar for All, as opposed to the Federal 17 funding for Solar for All, that some portion of this 18 additional resources, Illinois and IFA is asking for the 19 maximum \$250 million dollars that will enhance and expand 20 collective state efforts to bring solar to low-income and 21 disadvantaged communities; and so hence the partnership 22 with Power Agency and the Department of Commerce and 23 24 Economic Opportunity.



Page 24 The middle bucket, the \$14 billion dollar 1 National Clean Investment Fund, the NCIF, again that's 2 with the Coalition for Green Capital and the final bucket 3 is the CCIA and I had talked about that the Rust Belts to 4 5 Green Belts application. Next slide. This just a quick highlight 6 7 of the IFA Climate Bank/State of Illinois Solar for All GGRF Application. Just very high level. 8 Next slide. This is a highlight of the 9 requirements of the National Clean Investment Fund and 10 our work with Coalition for Green Capital. 11 12 And next slide. This is the National Community Investment Fund/World Business Chicago/Innovate 13 Illinois. I think the Members are probably sensing a 14 theme of partnership and team members that is desired by 15 the Federal government through these many, many funding 16 opportunities. That's a high level summary there. 17 Next slide. And I'm very pleased 18 particularly on this one. This is our first direct 19 funding from the Federal Government and first through the 20 Department of Energy ever to the Authority. This is 21 formula funding. It's a five-year round of funding. 22 It's up to \$40 million dollars. Several years ago 23 24 beginning in February of '21, the Finance Authority at



Page 25 the request of the Governor's Office had begun an 1 2 engagement and a partnership with one of these two organizations, the Illinois Municipal Electric 3 Association, although they do have a branch that deals 4 with natural gas and we made some loans all of which are 5 performing and/or are turned off in response to some 6 7 adverse weather due to climate change in February of '21 that has grown into a productive partnership. You've 8 seen the result both in this funding and in the press 9 releases from the Federal Government and from IFA with a 10 quote from the Governor. And we do have one pending 11 12 competitive application, again called the GRIP that's up to \$120 million dollars. This is a grid with the DOE 13 that is formula funding, again, with the same partners, 14 the roque electric cooperatives and the municipal 15 utilities. Most of this we anticipate will be deployed 16 through grants through a competitive process and we're 17 going to have to build that capacity out. 18 Next slide. In addition to not only the 19 public facing effort here this morning, but we continue 20 to have ongoing conversations and in-person 21 presentations. Brad Fletcher and I went out to the Quad 22 Cities. There was the presentation before the Commerce 23 24 Commission's Policy Hearing, and then Evans Joseph went



down to South Eastern Illinois to only -- to explain and promote the SSBCI, small business lending program which we are receiving those federal funds as Six noted through a grant mediator through the State Department of Commerce.

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6 Next slide. Just to remind everybody, 7 this extensive stakeholder engagement that we've been 8 pursuing since last November has really resulted in this 9 sort of input what we call the placemat and many of 10 priorities are reflected in various ways in these federal 11 funding applications.

12 And finally, the last slide. What we affectionately call the alphabet and number soup. After 13 Thursday, the final -- we will move all of these to red 14 that we have either filed the application or blue that we 15 are receiving the money. So it's been quite a journey. 16 Our first official Federal application was a concept 17 paper for the U.S. DOE GRIP Program that was back in 18 January. We filed the application in May. There are 19 some indications from the State's DC team that we could 20 be hearing news on that sometime between now and the end 21 of the calendar year. The \$13 to \$15 million dollars 22 that is coming through the Illinois Environmental 23 24 Protection Agency again for the Built Environment Energy



Page 27 1 Efficiency and Revolving Loan Fund. That appears to be 2 -- that's formula funding, but that appears to now have 3 shifted to a January 2024 date. 4 The final point on the Greenhouse Gas 5 Reduction Fund, as far as we can tell, it looks like

6 announcements may be made in March of 2024 with several 7 months of discussions between the winning applicants and 8 U.S. EPA with funding between mid-summer of '24 and 9 September of '24. The theme that we understand of all of 10 these streams of Federal funding from the Governor's DC 11 office is that there's a goal to sign and obligate these 12 funds by September of '24.

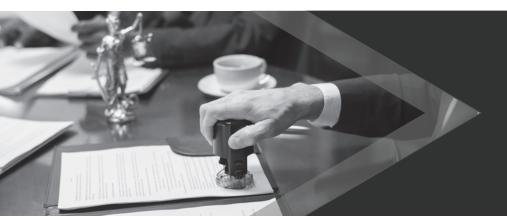
